## MESSAGE FROM THE CONVENER

In my work as a youth leader and with the youth I have come to appreciate the determination, commitment, resilience and optimism of youth. Unfortunately, most of what is reported about youth in Kenya is always negative and largely about their numbers. Similarly those engaging with youth especially in the informal settlements tent to overlook the fact that youth are already organized.

Most importantly we need to understand the needs of the youth and how youth are involved in problem solving. We need to start viewing youth as an asset not liability.

This report entitled Locating the Youth is an attempt to bring out youth issues and how youth are organizing to deal with a myriad socio-economic and political challenges and concerns that they face. The data collected shows that youth are neither seated somewhere waiting for their turn to come nor are they waiting for solutions, but they are doing everything within their means to make a difference in their lives and that of the society. # PREFACE: NOT IN THE 'WAITING ROOM'

When I was invited by my long time friend and comrade, Raphael Obonyo, to be part of The Youth Congress, I was delighted. My delight at the time was mainly because we were not talking of 'The' Youth Congress but of Kasarani Youth Congress. I was glad that ours was not an idea of hegemony but one of seeking what can apply nationally from a specific location and history. Raphael and I grew- up and worked together in Korogocho, which is a political ward within Kasarani constituency in Nairobi. As citizens of Korogocho, we have always shared concern that youth have had dismal bearing in shaping the Korogocho we want. But, Raphael led us into agreeing that what produces the limits of life in Korogocho is not necessarily situated in Korogocho. In fact they seemed rather caged in the bigger political space. Thus, the idea of the Kasarani Youth Congress was to bring together the fragments of youth action within this political boundary so as to open dialogue for effective and dignified youth citizenship in Kasarani constituency and beyond.

A major project in this endeavor was the audit of the Kazi Kwa Vijana (Work for Youths) initiative in Kasarani constituency. The results of the KKV social audit were shocking. Our first concern was that Kazi Kwa Vijana was not treated as work as such but as mere token from where no youth would develop firm social footprints or improve their capabilities. However, most appalling was that KKV was applied as if youths in Kasarani never existed in any formations such as youth groups before KKV. In other words, the implementation of the initiative suggested that before KKV, there was no history of youth and youth hood as a collective identity in Kasarani. KKV never acknowledged that youth in Kasarani had long formed groups at their own behest.

This report is informed by our sadness from the findings of KKV. The research towards this report is also a bold step by The Youth Congress in making claim that it is an effective and appropriate forum of expressing and responding to the issues that we have observed not just in Kasarani but of what is manifest amongst many other Kenyan Youth. I have had an opportunity to read this report. Its style and idea are major affront on many assumptions. But I think that it responds to two major assumptions. The first assumption that it disrupts is that of the youths as leaders of tomorrow. It has been said that indeed this maxim is now worn out and makes little grammatical and logical sense. But the findings of this study demonstrate how those in authority treat the youth as a preparatory category rather than a present future. Youths are often urged to spend their time preparing to take over. While there is no doubt that the biological age of youth hood coincides with structured formative years, it does not follow that the youth are in a mere waiting room. I have taken this notion of waiting room to mean a situation whose next course is left almost wholly in the hands of those in the room of action. Think of a patient waiting to see a doctor for instance. Although they they may have power to make certain decisions, the doctor's actions tend to be rather determinate for their next course of action. While this metaphor befits the way officialdom relates and treat most youths in Kenya, the practice of youth hood is very different.

This report has established that youths have clear idea of what should be modern Kenya. They want to influence the text, texture and rhythm of this modernity. Unfortunately, most of what they bring on board is regarded as subversive or inappropriate. This report disputes such notions that view youth initiatives as subversive and inappropriate.

Although the mapping exercise focused on all the eight constituencies in Nairobi, it ended up picking up much more information from the low-income settlements. We are sad that youth formations in high income settlements communicate less. But we are also glad that in the low-income settlements where youths have for long been associated with chaos is where we recorded highest rate of youth organizing.





#### A PROFILE OF YOUTH INITIATIVES IN NAIROBI COUNTY

The number of youth groups there (most of them without state registration) is overwhelming. However, we are sad that rather than generate alternative politics and relational model, these subaltern groups struggle with the vices of corruption, sexism, patriarchy and ethnicity. While this did not surprise much, it is sad that false consciousness is so deeply rooted that it tends to undermine the backbone for the change we have been yearning for.

In this report, we have an opportunity of moving beyond the talk of youth as some broad category. Here you have a useful anatomy that dispels myths and limiting assumptions about Kenyan youths. The report embodies unparalleled potential in expanding youths capability while at the same time generates a modernity that is inclusive and able to sustain dignified citizenship for all.

# **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

The mapping exercise carried out by The Youth Congress and whose findings are captured in this report seeks to bring out youth issues and how youth are organizing to deal with adverse conditions and challenges that they face as individuals and as a constituency in their respective locations. Indeed, the main aim of the exercise was to collect, analyze and provide data on how young people influence and are influenced by socio-economic and political contexts. The central objective of the mapping exercise was twofold. First is to identify and ensure recognition of youth issues and initiatives. Second was to bring out youth organizing as an important and inevitable starting point to youth emancipation.

In this report, we present the findings of the mapping exercise that exposes the reality of youth, youth issues and youth initiatives in Nairobi County. We also make recommendations on possible ways of addressing some of the challenges. Most importantly, we emphasize on the need to recognize youth issues and youth initiatives as a first step towards solving youth problems and advancing youth causes In the same vein, we argue that youth organizing is important in the search for youth emancipation.

The mapping exercise was conducted in all the eight constituencies in Nairobi Province now referred to as Nairobi County after the promulgation of the new Constitution. These were Kasarani, Embakasi, Dagorreti, Starehe, Kamukunji, Westlands, Lang'ata and Makadara. The exercise included identification of youth groups within the constituencies, physical locations of the groups, types of activities, organization structure, nature of membership in the groups and issues affecting youths and deter youth organizing in the constituencies.

The report provides shocking as well as insightful revelations. It establishes that most youth groups and organizations are located in slum areas where youth face myriad socio-economic and political challenges. Data collected also indicate that a majority of youth initiatives aim at dealing with adverse economic and social conditions that they face.

It is clear from the 700 youth groups identified and contacted in Nairobi alone that youth are making endeavors to ensure personal and collective improvement and development through engagement in different socio-economic and political initiatives. This brings out the sense of optimism and resilience by youth. While there are indications that youths are making endeavors to deal with the numerous socio-economic and political challenges that are barriers to their decent livelihoods, their effort can generally be described as inadequate, patchy and not sustainable. Painfully clear is that there is little support and recognition of their initiatives especially by the Government.

The challenges coupled with the inadequacies (in provisions of enablers to good livelihoods) make youth quite vulnerable. Moreover, lack of gainful occupations has left many youths idle with no opportunities for decent livelihoods. This explains in part the rising cases of drug abuse, alcoholism, HIV/Aids, crime, unplanned pregnancies and a myriad of other poverty related problems amongst the youth. However, it is vital to note that while such realities make youth victims and perpetrators, they also strengthen them as enablers of change.

Through this report, the aspiration of The Youth Congress is to ensure recognition of youth issues and initiatives and to contribute to a better organized and integrated youth constituency that is empowered and able to activate their agency and realize their full potential.



# **KEY RECOMMENDATIONS**

#### 1. UNEMPLOYMENT:

With lack of employment and an enabling environment to earn a living many young people, especially in Nairobi, are forced to make income through very precarious ways that endanger their lives and that of other citizens. The Government needs to develop a comprehensive programme to deal with the rising unemployment amongst the youth. Programmes like Kazi Kwa Vijana have failed to address unemployment amongst the youth. Efforts to address employment concerns must be linked to national strategies. Most importanity, significat resourses must be allocated to youth employment.

#### 2. MISMANAGEMENT OF YOUTH FUNDS AND PROGRAMMES:

According to the report, there is massive mismanagement of youth funds and programmes initiated by the Government in the constituencies. Corruption and mismanagement of public funds meant for the youth continues to cause more suffering to the youth. Kenya Anti Corruption Commission needs to have local offices where youth can report corruption cases. There is need for far reaching legislation and programmes to eliminate corruption that stifles youth development.

#### 3.Drug abuse and alcoholism:

There are many youths in the constituencies who are idle and whose energies are yet to be tapped in projects that would help them with steady income and sustainable livelihoods. Many have found themselves in drugs and alcoholism as a way of escaping harsh realities that they experience. While there is a need to deal with the larger political economy of criminal enterprises and 'informal state' a further enabler would be involving youth in creative ventures. The Government and other public actors in Kenya should review aspects that make youths victims of development and develop programmes to nurture and provide opportunities for youth.

#### 4. REGISTRATION OF YOUTH GROUPS AND ORGANIZATIONS:

The findings of this study were that the average registration cost for youth groups is Ksh. 8,000 (for CBO) and Ksh. 15,000 (for NGO). The Youth Congress proposes that the registration costs be reviewed since a majority of groups cannot raise the funds required. The Youth Congress also recommends that the registration procedures be simplified and made more efficient, affordable and youth friendly and efficient.

#### 5. Socially unacceptable groups and cartels:

As in many other postcolonial situations, democracy, market liberalization and disorder have gone hand in hand. As the youth are actors for circulation of disorder in Kenya, there is a need to deal with the roots of the problems that force the youth to engage in initiatives and groups that are socially unacceptable and seem to threaten socio-economic and political stability of the country. There is need to explore a different way of dealing with such initiatives other than use of brutal force like has been the case. Noteworthy, the brutal force only serve to create more hostility and problems.

#### 6.Accessibility of youth funds and government services:

There seems to be a general but acute lack of information on policies and government programmes thus stifling meaningful participation and development of the public and in particular the youth. The government should institute a participatory model of governance that ensure its citizens are well informed of policies in place, contribute to formulation of new policies and are adequately prepared to leverage these programmes to their advantage.

#### 7. Recognition of youth groups and initiatives:

Apparently, youth issues and initiatives remain unrecognized and unattended to. The government should recognize youth issues and initiatives in its programming. In addition, the government and other partners should support activities initiated by the youth groups. Youth are already doing so much by themselves and all that is needed are ways to bolster their efforts without reinventing the wheel.

#### 8. EMPOWERMENT PROGRAMMES:

In most of the slums, youth talent and capacity is wasted and remains untapped. There is a need to create favorable conditions for young people to develop their skills and capability to ensure the sound economic, social and political development and achievement of their full potential. This is most important in the context of youth bulge in Kenya where there is a rising youth population and limited opportunities and resources to cater for their numbers.

#### 9. Youth organizing:

Successful advocacy for change and youth emancipation will be fast tracked through youth effective organizing. In this sense, youth need to get better organized and network amongst themselves with a view to consolidating a formidable youth constituency. Youth are largely portrayed as a chaotic lot. They must refuse attempts by the authorities to regard their organizing as a threat to the establishment.

#### 10.Young women:

Youth are not homogenous especially if the protracted problems that young women face compared to young men. Youth must also include both young men and young women. Youth groups and organizations must make every possible endeavor to incorporate, empower and ensure meaningful and active participation of young women. Most importantly, young women must take up positions of leadership and ensure that their interest and concerns are taken care of.

# 1.0 INTRODUCTION

#### 1.1. ABOUT THE YOUTH CONGRESS

The Youth Congress is an independent youth initiative in Kenya committed to youth leadership, participation, collective action and emancipation. It came into being in 2007 to provide a shared platform for the youth to consolidate their position and ensure improvement of their conditions by addressing the social, economic and political disorders that subject them to desperation and inhuman living conditions.

#### THE YOUTH CONGRESS STRATEGIC OBJECTIVES:

- 1. Enable the youth to champion and enjoy human rights, good governance and justice;
- 2. Empower the youth to actively engage in conflict transformation, reconstruction and national cohesion
- 3. Animate the youth to explore their talents, skills and knowledge for socio economic development
- 4. Develop The Youth Congress into a vibrant, independent, reputable, effectiveyouth organization and space.

#### 1.2. Connecting and strengthening youth causes

Since its establishment in 2007, The Youth Congress has been keen on strengthening youth organizing and connectivity especially at the community level. In particular, it has been developing and carrying out programmes and strategies that connect and consolidate the youth constituency and are geared towards enhancement of youth organizing for individual and collective emancipation. This is out of the realization that efforts by individuals and individual groups can realize very little compared to well coordinated and connected efforts. Consequently, The Youth Congress has emerged as a leading and reliable youth agent and space in Kenya.

#### 1.3. Mapping Youth issues

In keeping to its mission of providing a platform for the youth, The Youth Congress carried out a mapping exercise of youth issues and initiatives in the eight constituencies in Nairobi County. The constituencies were: Starehe, Kasarani, Dagoretti, Embakasi, Kamukunji, Westlands, Langata and Makadara. The report gives statistics and makes available evidence and knowledge on the situation of young people in Nairobi County. The report also gives pointers of where there are gaps that require the attention of youth and other actors. Most importantly it brings out the energies and very positive endeavors by young people.

The data collected is meant to assist in setting up youth leagues in Nairobi. Similarly, the data on existing youth groups and organizations will assist in network building at various levels. Although this data was collected within political boundaries of Nairobi County, simulation and discussions undertaken in this report are also aimed at expanding the contours of analysis so as to give pointers to the contemporary boundaries around which youth organizing can be done.

The report gives some surprising as well as interesting findings gathered from the eight constituencies in Nairobi. At the economic front, the report provides revealing statistics of high unemployment amongst the youth population, a fact that contributes to crime and insecurity. The dominance of models of modernity that deny urban citizenship and opportunities for decent living has pushed the youth into drugs and crime. This explains why youth form the largest portion of slum residents and that most youth groups /organizations are based in the slums areas. At the margins of these groups is yet another cohort of 'socially unacceptable' groups that comprise a majority of unemployed youth.

#### A PROFILE OF YOUTH INITIATIVES IN NAIROBI COUNTY

Noteworthy is that the report brings out the fact that most groups in the constituencies especially in the informal settlements are youth initiatives. This suggest to the kind of political society formed by the youth where their actions and occupations best get expressions through associations and groups some that are regarded as illegal.

Most youth groups (about 70%) that were mapped seek to solve socio-economic issues within their areas with the core objective of creating employment and being self-reliant. The activities range from income generation to those that aim to eradicate social ills that youth engage in due to idleness and unemployment. In all the eight constituencies, youth seem to be making every possible endeavor at their own level to make a living and improve personal conditions as well as those of the community. They remain optimistic that through youth organizing, people can be able to resolve some of the challenges and hurdles that curtail their growth and development. This is clearly demonstrated by the high number of youth groups and organizations.

Atleast 700 youth initiatives were identified and contacted during the mapping exercise that was carried out in Nairobi county alone. Most of these youth groups are located in the slum areas in the respective constituencies. The report provides a database of youth groups in Nairobi County. This is essential as it would open up and strengthen avenues for engagement with and amongst youths



## 2.0 BACKGROUND

#### 2.1. YOUTH POPULATION AND CONDITION IN KENYA

According to Kenya National Bureau of statistics 2009 census, the population of Kenya is about 40 million people. Youth between the ages of 15-34 years form about 36% of the total population. Those between ages 1-34 years constitute about 78% of the population. This shows that the youth form the highest percentage of the nation's population.

Despite the numerical significance of youth, they remain absent in the mainstream socio-economic and political processes. However, as is apparent in this study, the rising criminality associated with the youth is not necessarily a reflexive, antisocial response to poverty or joblessness, scarcity, or other effects of structural adjustment). Instead, it is rather a dialectic between a dominant economy and a youth centered economy and political system that runs in parallel and competition to the dominant socio-cultural-economic and political model.

About 60% of the youth between ages 15-34 years are living in urban slums and again below the economic poverty line. They have minimal or no access to decent shelter and social amenities like health facilities, educational facilities and infrastructure. A majority of the youth population is unemployed and lacks a consistent source of income and are said to be languishing in abject poverty because of such.

#### 2.2. YOUTH AND UNEMPLOYMENT IN KENYA

In the last two decades, Kenya's economy has lagged behind in generating employment and other occupations for the larger number of young entrants into the national economic and political space. A majority of youth in Kenya and especially those in the urban slums lack sustainable sources of income contributing to 'socially unacceptable' means of survival. This coincidence between youth unemployment and crime has resulted in persistent criminalization of the youth. Indeed, a large number of persons in Kenyan prisons and those in the wanted list by the police are most often the youth. Moreover, the high rates of unemployment have left the youth idle, thus more and more are engaging in prostitution, drug abuse, drug peddling and a myriad of social ills. Due to unemployment, the youth in urban slums have become prone to political manipulation with many cases of politicians organizing youths into their private militia or campaigners.

In all the eight constituencies visited in this exercise, unemployment has had various impacts on the youth, both positive and negative. On the negative front, youth are being misused by political aspirants; politicians pay youth to cause havoc and intimidate other political aspirants. The youth are indulging in consumption of illegal brews, abusing drugs, engaging in prostitution and joining illegal gangs to earn a living or at least evade the hardships.

In a more positive side of it, youths are in search for a reliable source of income. There has been a tremendous rise in youth organizing to try to create job opportunities for the unemployed. The youth groups and organizations formed are engaging in small-scale businesses to sustain their members. The businesses range from car wash activities, farming, garbage collection activities, water vending and managing kiosks. Unemployed youth living in slum areas have resorted to tapping of basic utilities from distributor companies and charging residents a supply fee. On the other hand, prostitution, drug peddling and abuse and pregnancy rate is remarkably increasing among the female youth. Although some of the actions of the youths appear in a category with a thin line between legal and illegal, youth seem to define new models of urban economic and political life.

#### 2.3. Young people and exclusion

There is evidence that the youth remain economically, socially and politically marginalized despite their numerical majority and struggles against marginality. Despite the high numbers of youth population, access to political power remains elusive. It is indeed true that youth are always viewed as mere recipients. They are often incorporated in the later stages of policy and decision making involvement in decision-making needs to be addressed. Unequal access to positions and opportunities tends to deepen young people's life prospects.

Unequal access to opportunities and positions perpetuates youth exclusion. Since youth are hardly represented in the political class or decision-making processes, it follows that there are few who attend to the needs or wants of young people. Through continual exclusion from the decision-making processes and through absence of effective youth representation in the political class, the void of youth agency and lack of influence continues to grow.

#### 2.4 Youth Organizing in Kenya

The first African political pro-Kenya group against the colonial government began in 1921 by the Young Kikuyu Association led by Harry Thuku at age 26. In preparation for efforts to gain freedom from the colonial rule, members comprised of Kikuyu, Embu, Meru and Kamba community took an oath of unity and secrecy leading to the formation of Mau Mau movement that hemorrhaged the colonial government. The Mau Mau would recruit young men who were fit to fight the war against the 'mbeberu'-white man. These were among the very first organized groups in Kenya with a cause aligned to national interest.

In recent years, many groups have emerged each with different missions at hand. Examples abound of youth organizing in Kenya where youth have sought to come together to rally for better conditions. Young people are building initiatives in an effort to bring likeminded individuals to collectively address their issues.

Due to lack of financial capability to initiate individual business projects, the youth are coming together with an aim to create employment. They are also coming together to pursue a myriad of youth and youth related programmes. The youth group activities seek to address their socio-economic issues by: creating employment that gives them a sustainable source of income. Surprisingly, youth organizing is viewed as a crime by those who are bent to perpetuate the *status quo*.

#### 2.5 Youth organizing in the slums

The slum population, which largely constitutes the youth, is growing very fast. This is partly caused by high rural to urban migration, unbearable costs of living and poor employment opportunities in the urban areas. As revealed by the mapping, most youth groups in all eight constituencies are located in slum areas. A closer look at the youth groups and organizations in the areas shows similarity in that the groups seek to address their socio-economic issues through the creation of employment ventures. A majority of the groups and organizations are organized within a particular age group and members of every group have similar issues and interests.

The report reveals a consistent increase in youth organizations in the urban slums. Some of the actual and possible reasons include: rising poverty levels and little devoted government attention to youth issues in these areas resulting in grouping up to seek better conditions. However, part of the challenge in youth organizing in the slum is considered or rather equated to dissent, disloyalty and a threat to the establishment.





## 3.0. METHODOLOGY OF MAPPING

#### 3.1. RATIONALE OF THE MAPPING EXERCISE

The Youth Congress realizes that there is a lacuna and lack of a vibrant youth organization that is independent, responsive, and effective to facilitate youth agency in Kenya with a strong ideology and philosophy. The youth are mobilized but never organized to engage in real action thus most of the social capital is harvested by a few self seekers, especially politicians. In addition there seem to be lack of connectivity of youth issues and initiatives yet this could ensure greater achievement and progress.

The mapping exercise sought to identify existing youth organizations and organizations working on youth issues in Nairobi province now referred to as Nairobi County after the promulgation of the new constitution. The mapping exercise was conducted in all the eight constituencies in Nairobi namely, Dagoreetti, Starehe, Kasarani, Embakasi, Kamukunji, Langata, Westlands and Makadara. In all the eight constituencies, the mapping exercise targeted youth initiatives both registered and non-registered and whose membership compose of youth between ages 15-35 years. Six youth were selected and trained on data collection by a lead consultant.

About 700 youth organizations some with formal registration and others without formal registrations were identified through Government and Community offices, existing youth networks, programmes and snow balling. All the 700 youth organizations were interviewed based on a question guide that was administed by the research assistants.

In addition, of secondary data was carried out to firm up the primary data that had been collected. The review of secondary data entailed desktop research and review of books and reports with information on youth and youth issues in Kenya and beyond.





FIGURE 4.2: POPULATION IN THE EIGHT CONSTITUENCIES OF NAIROBI COUNTY





#### 4.2. POLITICAL AND SOCIO-ECONOMIC REALITIES

#### 4.2.1 POLITICAL REALITIES

- i.) In some wards within the constituencies, politicians fund youth groups to protect their political interests and intimidate other political aspirants. As most of these political interests and chiefdoms are organized on ethnic ideology, the result has been youths being increasingly attracted to ethno identity and organizing.
- ii.) The report reveals that youth in the slums are prone to political manipulation and abuse.
- iii.) There is the existence of youth cartels in most of the slums.
- iv.) There are wrangles amongst the youth that are propagated by factors such as negative ethnicity, poor management and leadership, political interference and lack of resources.



#### 4.2.2 Socio-economic Realities

- i.) There are increasing cases of unemployment amongst the youth, thus a majority are compelled to move to the urban slums and engage in activities that are considered as socially unacceptable.
- ii.) Though some are mismanaged, there are some Constituency Development Fund, Local AuthorityTransfer Fund, Youth Fund, and Kazi Kwa Vijana with integrated components of youth support.
- iii.) In five of the constituencies, Dagoretti, Embakasi, Westlands, Kasarani and Starehe, there is the existence of youth catels.
- iv.) Poverty has made it impossible for youth living in informal settlements to access basic needs and services such as water and electricity. It has forced the unemployed youth in such areas to tap and re-distribute services and commodities to residents at a fee.
- v.) Existing government regulations with regard to construction space near riverbanks has created opportunity for the youth to use the 30 meters space between the river and construction to do farming and in turn sell the produce.
- vi.) Drug abuse, HIV/AIDS and alcoholism have taken toll on the youth in all the eight constituencies.





FIGURE 5.2 MALE VERSUS FEMALE LEADERSHIP IN GROUPS AND ORGANIZATIONS

# 5.0 Recommendations and Conclusion

This report is evidence that youths in selected areas of Kenyan urban settings continue to engage and interact in a context that is simultaneously dynamic and static. On the one hand, there is increasing recognition that a discourse of modernity, democracy and public culture that marginalizes the youth is neither democratic nor is it able to deliver the promise of an all inclusive development. In any case, the much touted economic growth in Kenya between 2003 and 2007 has not resulted in practical improvement for the conditions of youths. There is also recognition that the persistent asymmetry between the old and the young in terms of economic benefits, political participation and accommodation of opinion remains detrimental to national harmony and order. This explains why for the first time the state has invested in a generation of income opportunities for the youth. Kazi Kwa Vijana and National Youth Fund have the potential of starting a process that can enable the realization of youths' capability and further accelerate their efforts to overcome persistent poverty.

Beyond affirmative action, political structures also seem to have opened up space to accommodate political competition for the youths. There has been an upsurge in the number of youths competing for political offices through various political parties. This indicates a shift from the perspective of the yester years that had nothing beyond the marginal slot of youth and women representatives.

Related to this is the zeal to display 'new' public culture. The ongoing contestation over what constitutes decent dressing as played out between the deputy speaker and Hon. Mike Mbuvi (popularly known as Sonko) is with no doubt important. Sonko insisted that the youth would have no problem donning on a stud. The speaker on the other hand declared this improper dress code cannot be accommodated in parliament. It remains interesting to note that during the debate, the speaker did not go unchallenged. These debates and encounters indicate a dynamic Kenya where being a youth is treated as a living present rather than a mere state in the waiting room.

At the same time however, there still exists notions and practices that treat youths and youth hood as a mere state that is at best preparatory. Under this notion, it is not uncommon to hear claims like: Youth are the leaders of tomorrow; Youths must learn from the elders and youths should protect the nation from invaders! This idea of treating youths as a reservoir of the future rather than today's actors remains manifest in our findings. Dominant public discourse under this perspective tends to mobilize the youth to protect status quo. Good youths are therefore those who learn without raising any question. In fact, youths' social agency manifest through fashion, songs, art and language are most often treated a deviance. However, these static and most often essentialist model of youth and youth hood is not just something out there. Our findings suggest that even amongst the youth some of the attributes that characterize our society such as ethnicity, inadequate participation of women, sexism and patronage define relationships amongst themselves. We established that the participation of women as well as the centrality of women related agenda in the youth groups appears marginal. While most groups had a general heterogeneous ethnic composition, it was instructive to learn that most members of youth groups seemed informed and attracted to the ideology of ethnicity.

The last general element that we observed and which informs our analysis here is the discourse that many use to analysis youths and youth hood in Kenya. We noted that youths and those around them engage with the various youth formations and individuals' expressions as youths in terms of discourses that seem bifurcated like: order and disorder; literate and illiterate; legal and illegal; ghetto (poor) and Babylon ( rich). Most often, many use these bifurcations to judge and construct the images of who should be a Kenyan youth. There seem in most occasions to exist a certain list that describe who should be a good youth. The list most often written from the perspective of patronage tends to suggest that any youth who do not match this idea are criminals and misfits. We were informed of these experiences by the youth. The youth reported that when they encounter police or other authorities they are treated with disdain as long as they do not fit the description (based on a list of a good youth that only exists in the minds of those in authority).

So what is the use of this report? As our findings demonstrate, this report remains useful in dealing with two major matters. First, the report demonstrates that the youth in Kenya are not a section of the population in a waiting room (that is waiting to be adults for them to start exercising their rights and obligations as Kenyans). Second, the report demonstrates that the youth in Kenya are not one homogenous group of people identically based on biological age. Rather, the findings demonstrate that beyond biological age, youth hood results from historical and social environments. While the report focused on the entire city of Nairobi, its findings established that there is a proliferation of youth groups in areas with low incomes. This finding dispels the often-dominant notion that such low-income areas are places of chaos and crime. In fact, when undertaking this research we encountered youths who associated these low income areas with such vices like crime, alcoholism, unprotected sex, and drug trafficking. While indeed there were reports of such incidences more frequent in the low income areas than they were reported in the high income settlements, we established that the problem is more the space of informality that exists in the low income areas rather than the youths from these areas as such. Many reported numerous cases to attest that those who operate and use these locations are often youths from varying locations.

The role of structural regulations also comes under focus in this survey. We established that requirements and procedures required for legal registration of youth groups is fraught with a restrictive framework that tends to benefit groups from affluent settlements. Most youth living in low income areas argue that the reason they need to register their groups is to build social solidarity and means of earning income. However, the bureaucratic system through which the youth get legal recognition require such in-depth and cumbersome paperwork that deters most groups from seeking legal recognition. It also remains important to note that most youth groups tend to start their activities on issues that are otherwise treated as illegal. For instance, at a time when the City Council of Nairobi was unable to collect and manage refuse, youth groups offered the service at a fee. Today this arrangement has been regularized albeit with extensive bureaucratic red tape and inefficiency from the Council. But, there urban agriculture booms in most informal settlements, being undertaken by youths in small-scales. This practice is still widely illegal as per the By-Laws of Nairobi City Council and Ministry of Agriculture land use codes.

In this conclusion, we would like to make six clarifications and state three action points.

#### **CLARIFICATIONS:**

- **1.About the Waiting Room:** We have established that the notion that youths are leaders of tomorrow or people living a rehearsal today for them to participate tomorrow is fiction. Youth have developed various models of their citizenship and what they require is for the dominant ideas of youthhood to learn from their practice. Therefore, there remains a need for a perspective and model of leadership that relate to youths as complete and competent citizens.
- **2.About Modernity and Income:** The ideas defining 'modern' Kenya are not singular or homogeneous. For instance, youth have clear ideas of what should constitute Vision 2030. The simple notion that youths just need employment in a modern Kenya is a misrepresentation. Through their youth groups, youth have generated ingenious models of income generation and modern Kenya, which if supported, would offer opportunity for both higher incomes as well as a more inclusive image of Kenya.
- **3.Patronage:** In the state of chocking poverty, patronage stands out as the biggest threat to a progressive and engaging youth constituency. There are persistent and consorted efforts by various interest groups to capture youths. Some of these interests especially political interests have been as creative as animating the formation of special groups to offer custody or perpetuate their interest. Youths are worried about their trend. They argue that they are more of captives than actors in this entanglement. There is a situation of struggle for survival in a choice less environment.
- **4.Reproduction of Dominant Discourses:** Kenya and 'Kenya-ness' is an identity that continues to be informed by many interests, histories and cultures. Patriarchy (manifest through discrimination of women and expression of masculinity as the normal script of personhood) and ethnicity (expressed through a fiction that there exists pure ethnic groups and collections such as The Kikuyu; The Luo and so on) continue to undermine an all inclusive identity. These struggles seem to inspire the way youths organize

themselves and how they tend to express their identity. Women remain marginalized in most groups while sexism runs rampant. Although ethnicity is not used to organize, it tends to inspire groups formations.

- **5.Illegality and Legality:** Many youth in most youth groups establish them in informal settlements because legal ideas marginalize them. In fact, legal systems have tended to produce marginality amongst Kenyan youths. Some of the activities like urban agriculture, or cartels that regulate or manage basic services like water or security, work in liaison with formal structures such as Nairobi Water Company and Kenya Police respectively. The ideas of modern Kenya shall thus need to dialogue with the emerging youth discourse of survival. In any case as attested with the case of garbage collection, it is not unusual to see that what is expressed by the youth as mere mechanisms of survival end up becoming the most viable models of generating livelihoods and urban solutions.
- **6.Spaces of Leadership:** Albeit the large number of youth groups and other formations in the various wards of Nairobi, it is seldom that leaders of these groups are regarded as leaders in their own accord. It was evident for instance that political party youth representatives tend to yield much more influence than leaders of various autonomous, and in most cases, effective youth groups. The reason for this, as established by the study, is because many do not regard leadership as long as it lacks a link to formal structures. The challenge of our time is to reiterate that one need not be a leader of partisan interest for their leadership to be affirmed as legitimate. Leaders of youth groups are as legitimate and outstanding leaders as are leaders of partisan formations.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS:

In addition to the various specific observations made by this study, we offer two recommendations:

- 1.Forge ward and constituency based networks. This is because we think that although we have done the study using political boundaries, we have established that the issues addressed by the youth groups transcend these boundaries. We also note that a significant number of youth groups and youth organizations have not been able to network effectively. Reasons for this is that youth groups and organizations:
  - Have no knowledge of each other's existence and poor or inadequate networking strategies; they lack a unifying factor or a platform where ideas can be consolidated and shared.
  - Lack proper communications channels e.g. working spaces, websites, emails, addresses etc.
  - · Do not possess adequate technological skills.
  - Remain without adequate leadership and management skills to tame diverse expectations.
  - Have no records of what activities other groups engage in, thus no knowledge of how to work together.
  - Lack the capacity to pull various organizations with similar interests together.
  - Do not know how to facilitate the networking process.
- **2. Formation of a National Youth League:** The Youth Congress believes that an effective organizing of the youths must de-centre the state and all other formations interested in capturing the state. We therefore suggest that rather than rely on political party Youth Wings, it is time to consolidate and organize a national and an importantly large Youth Constituency. There is need to device effective strategies for youth organizing. It is important to ensure that youth vision becomes the new centre for organizing.
